

Key Ideas

Oral presentation is the act of sharing information or ideas by word of mouth. Oral summary is a brief verbal presentation of main or important ideas in a text. Evaluative summary allows the listener to share opinion on the given text, but descriptive summary allows the listener to focus only on the main ideas and supporting explanations in the text. Subject matter refers to what the text is mainly about.

ORAL PRESENTATION

An **oral presentation** is the act of talking to people on a particular topic. During oral presentation, you listen to a speaker to understand the ideas talked about and share your opinions on it verbally. Some oral presentation situations include class meetings, classroom presentations, club meetings, group discussions and oral reports to teachers, classmates, friends, or parents. Oral presentation helps to educate, inform, and entertain the listener. Engaging in oral presentation will also help you develop your confidence in the use of the English language. The speaker is normally required to use simple language and make the ideas very brief to enable the listener to understand the speaker. Therefore, in oral presentation we need to use the skills of oral summary. Let us look at what oral summary is and some strategies for oral summary.

Oral Summary

An oral summary is a brief presentation of the main points of a text by word of mouth. It involves listening carefully to a given passage or narrative and identifying the main ideas stated and share them verbally. That is, you listen to the passage that you need to summarise (at least three times), locate the main idea in the passage and identify the parts of the talk that support the main idea and share the information by word of mouth. This means that in oral summary, you must present your main ideas verbally on an issue discussed in a passage or text that you listen to. For instance, what your teacher always does by repeating the main ideas of your English lesson verbally before he brings the lesson to an end is called oral summary. Now, we are going to read the short passage below and answer the questions that follow it.

Short Passage 1

We all fall sick at one point in our lives. Once you are sick, you are unable to do anything because you will become very weak. Ablorde is so sick that he cannot go to school. His doctor advises that he takes his medicines to get well again. Also, he must eat fruits such as orange, watermelon, and pineapple. If Ablorde wants to be well then, he will have to follow the doctor's advice.

Types Of Summaries



Descriptive Summary

Descriptive summary focuses on the main ideas and their supporting details. It involves identifying the important points or ideas raised in a text. Therefore, in descriptive summary, you are expected to summarise the main or important or relevant ideas presented in a read or an audio text.

Evaluative Summary

Evaluative summary gives room to the listener to assess the quality of the ideas or items presented in a text. This requires the individual to share his own opinion on the main ideas which are stated in a read or an audio text. Here, you are expected to use the basic or main ideas in the text to present your own opinion on them.

Strategies For Oral Summary

When you are listening to audio texts to do an oral summary, the following steps or strategies would be of help.

- 1. Listen attentively to the audio passage being played.
- 2. Think about what the passage is about.
- **3.** Listen to the passage again.
- 4. Identify the main ideas or points in the passage.
- 5. Summarise the main ideas or points without expressing your own judgement (do not use evaluative summary here) you can jot down notes here.
- 6. Keep it brief.
- 7. Express it in your own words
- 8. Orally provide the summary of the passage in an orderly manner.

What to Avoid in An Oral Summary Presentation

In an oral summary presentation, make sure you avoid the following

- 1. Exclude or do away with examples
- 2. Avoid the use of descriptive words (such as adjectives or modifiers)
- **3.** Avoid the use of figurative language (metaphor, simile, and personification)
- 4. Do not repeat the ideas
- 5. Do not present two ideas in one sentence
- **6.** Do not explain the main ideas (avoid giving details)
- 7. Do not present incomplete sentences.

- **1.** Key or main ideas: They refer to the important things or points mentioned in a presentation.
- 2. Supporting Ideas: These are explanations, descriptions, illustrations, or detailed information about the main ideas.
- **3.** Sentence: A sentence is a group of words arranged to make a complete meaning.
- **4. Modifier**: A modifier is a word or group of words that gives information about another word in the same sentence.
