INTRODUCTION

In the last section, you learned how to use words and tenses correctly when speaking. In this section, you will learn about how to listen and participate in conversation. Also, the lesson in this section is planned to help you explore different listening techniques and their effectiveness in various contexts. The various activities in the lesson will additionally help you practice active listening skills, such as asking clarifying questions and summarising information in a given situation. It is important to note that your ability to listen actively or attentively will not only enhance your listening skills but also improve your overall communication and interaction with others. It promises to be a very interesting lesson. Ensure you follow the lesson carefully and perform all the selfassessment activities.

By the end of the lesson, you as the student will be able to;

Listening Attentively To Ask Clarifying Questions And Participate Effectively In Conversations.

Key Ideas:

- **Listening** involves the ability to pay attention to a message and understand (decode) it and respond to what is being said.
- Active listening is the process of listening attentively while someone else speaks.

EFFECTIVE CONVERSATIONS

Conversation involves an oral exchange of feelings, thoughts, observations, ideas, or opinions between two or more people. This means that conversation comes with listening and talking between two or more people on a topic. To engage in effective conversation, you must develop your listening skills.

Listening is the act or process of receiving, making meaning from, and responding to spoken or nonverbal messages. In listening, a person hears what other people say and tries to make meaning of what is said. Listening involves more attention than hearing. You can hear many things but you only listen to the most important ones. When you listen, you need to make deliberate efforts not to just hear but also to understand what you hear. Therefore, active listening is very important when someone is speaking to you. You can only engage in active listening during a conversation when:

- you avoid distractions or things that divide your attention
- you pay attention to the body language (gestures) of the speaker
- you give feedback after the message is received or understood

This means that when you listen to a speaker's message, do not have divided attention. You need to focus on the speaker and the message he or she is passing across, most especially the main idea or the key issue.

	Every child is a gift from God and we all need to understand that.

	no discrimination. We just have to embrace people we meet in life on equal terms.

Ways to Develop Your Listening Skills

My dearest learner, it is good to understand that the importance of listening goes beyond school or academic environment. Your ability to practise good communication in your day-to-day interactions with your friends, family members and significant people in society is very important. To achieve this, you have to be a good listener. Therefore, in listening, do not just hear but make sure you make meaning of what you hear. To become a good listener, follow the steps below:

- Be alert or attentive (do not divide your attention)
- Maintain eye contact with the speaker
- Pay attention to body language and facial expression of the speaker where necessary
- Make a mental image of what the speaker is saying
- Avoid interruption- give people time to fully express themselves
- Don't jump into conclusion
- Summarise the key ideas mentally
- Provide feedback- provide responses and ask clarifying questions at the right time

Always, remember that it is important to listen first before asking questions or seeking clarifications. In the classroom, only ask questions when the teacher has finished explaining a concept. During group discussions, allow your colleagues the opportunity to express themselves, summarise the ideas expressed and ask clarifying questions. This will help you learn effectively in groups.





The Sequence or Order of a Story or an Event

We use sequence of events to share or narrate an event witnessed or experienced. A sequence of events refers to the arrangement of ideas in a story or a given text. For you to be able to listen attentively to a conversation, you must learn that events or ideas in a speech or things that are discussed in a text are arranged in a certain order to make meaning. Therefore, when you are listening to a conversation you must know which ideas are presented first, which ones come next, then which ones follow, and which ones come last. When you have this in your mind, you will be able to identify the main or key ideas that are presented in a speech or a conversation that you listen to. This will also help you understand whatever information that you pay attention to. The sequence of events is illustrated in the boxes below.
